

COURT HOUSE PLANS.

AN ATTRACTIVE BUILDING
WITHOUT ORNAMENTATION.

Entrances From Both Fifth and Sixth
Streets—Court Room to Be 40x60
Feet and Amply Lighted by Sky-
light.

The plans for the new third district court house, drawn by Louis E. Destremps, architect, provide for entrances from both the Fifth and Sixth street sides. On the right of the main corridor of the first floor on entering from the Fifth street side are the judge's private and public offices. From the private room is a door to the court room, to which there are several entrances from the main corridor. The court room is 40 by 60 feet and is amply lighted by a large skylight in the ceiling of the room.

Next west of the court room and with windows looking out on Sixth street is the civil court room.

At the left, on coming in from Fifth street, are the public and private offices of the clerk of court with the assistant clerk's room adjoining. The office of the probation officer, the juvenile court room, and consultation rooms occupy the rest of the floor space on the first floor.

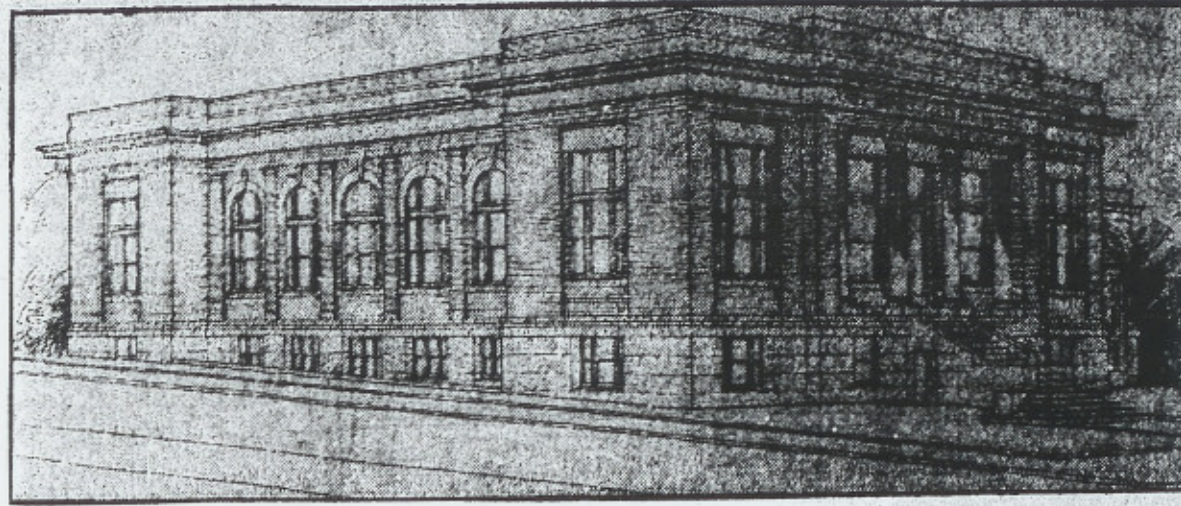
From the lane on the west of the building for the patrol wagon there are doors so that the prisoners may either be taken to the cell room in the basement or to the courtroom. In the basement are cells for women and men and two cells that will be used only for criminal prisoners. In the basement are rooms for the janitors, a large vault for the records, and store rooms.

On both the Fifth and Sixth street sides there are four columns. The body of the building will be of mottled brick with limestone corners and parapet and with a granite foundation.

The plans made by Mr. Destremps call for a building that, while being plain and without any unnecessary ornament, will at the same time be attractive. In the main corridor Mr. Destremps's plans call for marble panelling, four feet high. The rest of the interior decorations are plain.

NOT GIRL'S AS

EDWARD ETHIER
NIZED BY VICTIM

Arrested on Charge of
Indecent Exposure, Police Suspect-
ing Connected With
Rapes—Hearing Satur-

In the arrest last night Edward Ethier, 46 years old, of the street, charged with indecent exposure, the police do not believe that they had any part in the capture of the perpetrator of the outrages on women and children in the northwesterly part of the city.

Immediately following the arrest Deputy Chief of Police Charles J. O'Connell announced an investigation of the case in the hope that it might disclose the names of the victims of the assaults. The police are confident that the assailant will be captured.

At noon today Deputy Chief O'Connell was satisfied that Ethier was the man who committed the acts of villainy which have shocked the women and children of the city to a state of extreme terror.

Ethier was arraigned today on the charges of indecent exposure and guilty to the first and second. At the arraignment the belief of the police is that his connection with the offenses caused Prof. Taft to ask for a continuance until Saturday, a date which was granted. Ethier in the sum of \$1000 was unable to pay the fine.

It was as a result of the search made to the police by Mary Babola, 13 and respectively, and by X who claimed that Ethier was arrested on the charge of indecent exposure and guilty to the first and second.
