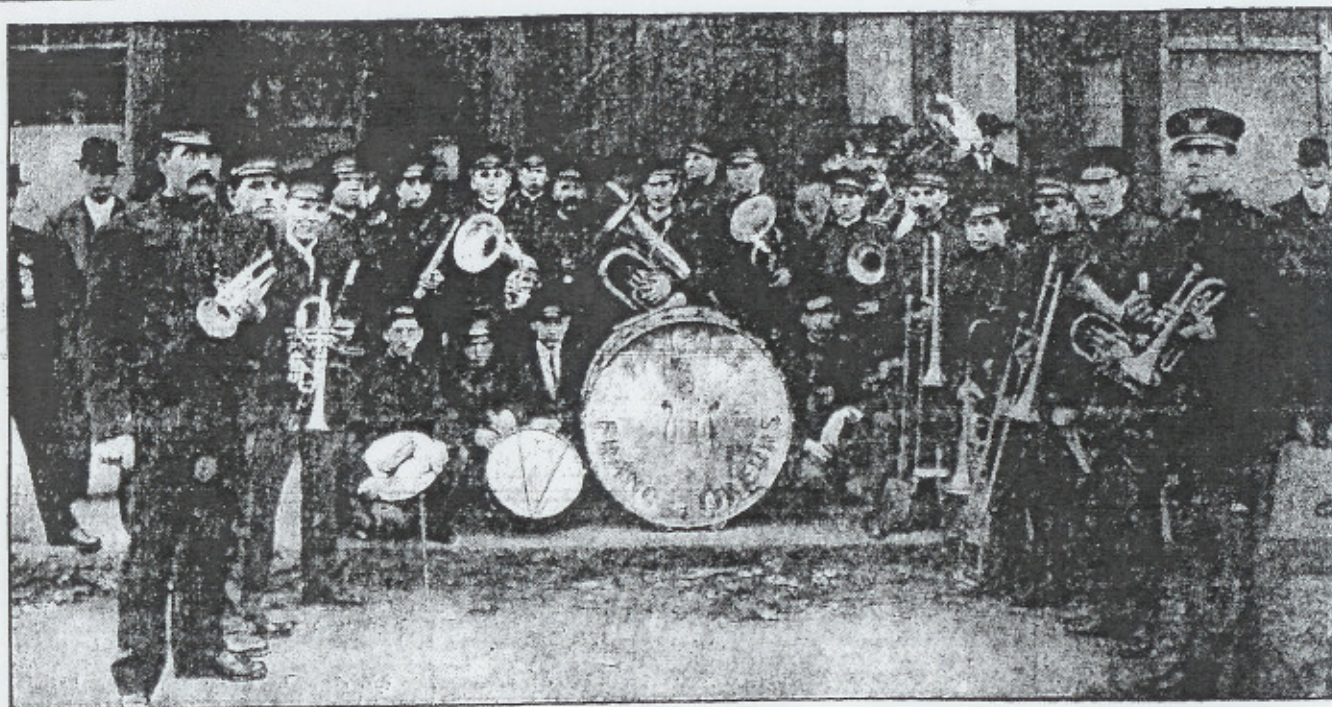

ALFALFA FOR BREAKFAST.

New York, Nov. 11.—That hay of the alfalfa variety can be made into a palatable food for human beings and has passed the experimental stage is being demonstrated as one of the features of the American Land and Irrigation exposition at Madison Square garden. Sudduth, of Montana, has demonstrated that leaves of the alfalfa plant can be made into a meal which serves the same purpose as graham and whole wheat flour.
