

CROSS SAVES TWIST DRILLS

His 130 and Last String Rally Wins for Leaders in Business Men's Loop

Frigidaire Team Takes Four Point Licking from Saf-T-Cabbies

A last string rally and a 130 string rolled by Sam Cross, saved the Morse Twist Drill No. 1 team from its first defeat in Division B of the Bankers and Business Men's League last night. The Stelger-Dudgeon team, its opponents, had driven the machinists to the wall in the first two strings, and had won both times, by 19 pins and seven pins.

In a desperate attempt to save themselves from a whitewash, the drillers came back into their usual form. Maule rolled 153, Quinn 104, and then Cross socked them for a 330. Molloy struck down 112 and Tom Kelley 104 and the final string went to the Drillers 858-528. When the final count was taken, the Morawmen had also won the pinfall by eight pins, a heart breaking result to the Stelgers. Cross featured the match with a sum of 344, but illness of the Stelgers was only three pins behind him.

Drillers Retain Lead.

The match in no way endangered the standing of the Drillers, as they remain in the lead by a margin of 14 points more than the Stelgers, in second place.

Another surprise was the four-point licking given the Saf-T-Cabbies by the Frigidaire team. The drivers had a dummy with them but the rest of the team could do nothing right. Milt Marchant continued his good bowling for the Frigidae, opening with a 122 string and summing up at 336.

The Public Marketeers, as did the Drillers, rallied in a final string after losing the first two, to pile up the pins and win the pinfall from the Brenneke caterers, by a margin of 23 pins. It was the 157 bowled by Ellis that was a big help in this rally.

Corsons Defeat Bush and Company.

The lowboys, the Corson's garage-men, stepped ahead of the Standard Oilers by getting a point from the Bush and company team. The Socony men were rattled for four by the Defiance team. The Standard men were forced to the limit by the Goodyears but came away with three more points after losing the last string by six pins. The needles had won the first by the same margin.

WILL TACKLE ZONE PROBLEM

Fairhaven Planning Board to Consider Area South of Bridge
Town Meeting Vote on One Square Does Not Settle Question

The Fairhaven Planning board is meeting tonight in an endeavor to straighten out what has become a center of contention for years, the status of the district south of the New Bedford-Fairhaven bridge, which includes the blocks bounded by Middle, Bridge and Main streets and the park land on the north. The action of the Fairhaven town meeting last Saturday in voting to change the status of the square on the west side of Middle street, north side of Bridge street and south of the park land from an apartment district to a business district settled only a part of the long standing controversy.

There is now involved the status of the square on the east side of Middle street and the north side of Bridge street south of the park land, and also the property on the southeast corner of Middle and Bridge streets. Proposal is to extend the zone to include these last two areas in the business district.

Legality Not Questioned.

The first named area, that on the west side of Middle street and the north side of Bridge street, that referred to as Article 38 in the annual town meeting warrant acted on last Saturday, was approved as a business district by the Planning board, and the article recommending the change was adopted on motion made by James A. Stetson, chairman of the Planning board. The vote on this was unanimous, and so far as known there was every necessary requirement adhered to to ensure the legality of the vote on the change, despite some assertions to the contrary. At least the legality of the action is not questioned by the town officers or the members of the Planning board.

Articles 37 and 38 referred to the areas on the east side of Middle street
